### **Kevin Palmer**

Deputy Director in Welsh Government for Pedagogy, Leadership and Professional Learning

Kevin Palmer is currently a Deputy Director in Welsh Government for Pedagogy, Leadership and Professional Learning. His policy areas include Initial Teacher Education, NQT Induction and Professional Learning for all teachers and leaders, but also education research policy, pedagogy and innovation, and the Education Directorate's ongoing commitment to responding to COVID-19 through innovation in planning and practice.

His education career started in Academia as a lecturer in Literature and Philosophy while studying for his doctorate. From there he entered FE and taught English and Media studies alongside PGCE for FE Lecturers, including taking responsibility for college-wide Professional Learning in pedagogy and innovation. After a stint as an Assistant Principal in North Wales, he worked in technology-based pedagogy and innovation in Greater Manchester, and as part of the BSF team in Salford, where he led on learning transformation. He joined the Welsh Government team in 2018 to develop the National Approach to Professional Learning, conclude the new accreditation of ITE and build the foundations of our National Strategy for Educational Research and Enquiry.

His focus now is still on these aspects of the work, but also on our national conversation about teaching, Talk Pedagogy, Think Learning and on teaching and learning in the context of a new curriculum and the legacy of COVID-19. Kevin is intensely proud of what the Welsh education system has achieved since we began our reform journey some ten years ago, and on the way Welsh educators have responded to some of the most challenging conditions in our recent history. He hopes to continue working to support the realisation of our new curriculum and the achievement of the ambitious objectives our system has set itself.





### **Roy Leighton**

Founding Director of Positive Peace Cambridge and Senior Associate of Independent Thinking Ltd

Growing up in a working-class Black Country community with six brothers and sisters, Roy knows first-hand the challenges faced by children in such circumstances and the importance not only of high expectations and aspirations for all, but also the need for creative and compassionate approaches in the classroom. Indeed his current work, including his impressive MPhil from Cambridge and a 1991 Japanese award for his contribution to peace, culture and education, is very much focussed on peace and peace building in a world that is increasingly at odds with itself.
